

Dear Henrico County Citizens:

On behalf of the dedicated members of your Henrico County Division of Fire, it is my pleasure to provide you with the 2018 annual report. This year has been a year of significant transition for the Division of Fire. Chief Tony McDowell was selected to serve this county as the Deputy County Manager of Public Safety; a promotion that left a critical vacancy in the fire chief's office. I am humbled, and consider it quite a privilege, to have been selected to serve this great community as your new fire chief. You have my commitment to focus on PRIDE, our core values of professionalism, respect, integrity, dedication, and empathy. We will also continue to work to strengthen our internationally-recognized emergency services and our relationship with the community we proudly serve.

Growth was a common theme in 2018. Our members responded to over 48,000 calls to assist our community of more than 325,000 residents. This represents an increase of over 6,000 calls, since 2014 and has outpaced the addition of facilities and personnel. Despite this growth, your firefighters and emergency medical technicians continue to work tirelessly to protect lives and property in Henrico County - and they are second to none.

Being "second to none" is not simply a claim. In 2018, Henrico Fire was awarded reaccreditation for the fifth consecutive period. As an internationally accredited fire department for two decades, the Henrico Division of Fire has the honor of being the third-longest accredited fire department in the world. Henrico Fire was also the first county fire department to be both internationally accredited and hold an Insurance Services Office (ISO) rating of "Class 1." The members take PRIDE in this accomplishment, but remain committed to continuous improvement, good stewardship, and accountability.

Your fire and emergency medical service professionals, in partnership with the dedicated members of the county's volunteer rescue squads, are at the ready to mitigate emergencies in our community 24 hours a day, seven days a week, and 365 day a year. As you read this report, should you have any questions about the services we provide, or any suggestions about how we can improve our service to you, I encourage you to reach out to me or anyone in our staff.

A total of \$322,689,659 worth of property was placed at risk by fire in 2018. Although the county and its residents experienced \$5,820,387 worth of structural losses and \$2,044,143 worth of contents lost such as personal belongings, Henrico firefighters saved \$314,825,129 worth of that property.


In 2018 the Henrico Fire Smoke Alarm Initia tive:

1,736 homes visited that had been identified as at risk for needing a smoke alarm.

807 homes received smoke alarm installations.

1,364 individual alarms installed to ensure adequate protection in homes.

HIGH QUALITY MEDICAL RESPONSE



New Basic Life Support Ambulances

Changing community needs require fresh solutions. The largest growth in calls for service for Henrico Fire has been for medical complaints that are not urgent in nature such as a sprained ankle or flu like illness. These calls need to be answered but can keep our advanced life support ambulances from going to more critical calls such as a stroke or a heart attack. Beginning in July 2018, we staff two basic life support ambulances on weekdays to help handle the less urgent calls.

133: The number of times in just 5 months that an Advanced Life Support ambulance was able to respond to a critical call in its area because a lower acuity call was already being handled by one of our new BLS ambulances.

Emergency Medical Dispatch

Every emergency response begins in the Emergency Communications Center or 911 Center. This year, Henrico County invested in new systems for Emergency Medical Dispatch (EMD) and Emergency Fire Dispatch (EFD). These systems use nationally researched and validated questions to help 911 operators get the information they need to ensure that we are sending the right resources to calls for help, making sure that we send fire and EMS units to calls where they are needed and don't send them where they are not.



The AutoPulse Difference

When a patient's heart has stopped, high quality CPR is critical to keep their blood moving until their heart can be started again. The best CPR, performed under ideal conditions, is only about 30% as effective as a healthy heartbeat. This year, we placed AutoPulses on all of our ambulances. AutoPulses use a band that wraps around a patient's chest to squeeze them more efficiently than CPR. This creates blood flow about 60% as effective as the patient's own heartbeat. Localities around the country have seen an increase in patient survival when using the AutoPulse and Henrico is excited to see how these devices help our patients.

Specialty Services

Henrico Fire continues to operate highly trained teams that provide services in technical rescue, hazardous materials management, marine operations, and drone deployment. Our teams answer many calls for service and the spring 2018 flooding in central Virginia were responsible for some of the calls. (Left) Firefighters perform a rescue after a car was swept off the road by rising flood waters. This is also an important reminder for drivers not to try to cross roads covered in water. Turn around, don't drown!

Maintenance and Repair

(Below) A firefighter works in the division's sew shop completing repairs to a firefighter's protective gear. The division operates several such shops to perform maintenance and repair on equipment instead of sending it out for someone else to do it. This gets the equipment back in use faster and saves money.

We remain committed to our investment in one of Henrico's most precious resources, children. We continue to partner with other agencies in the Achievable Dream Academy at Highland Springs Elementary School where children are offered a brighter future through a program that promotes engage-

Children are also more likely to be hurt by fire so we have our Junior Firefighter program and Fourth Grade Education program. The Junior Firefighter program ensures that children in Henrico schools get very basic fire life safety knowledge in either first, second, or third grade. The Fourth-Grade program ensures that every fourth-grader gets information about fire prevention and escape planning.
