



White Oak *Quercus alba* Native to every county in Virginia

- Can grow to be 100 feet tall
- Has the potential to live for centuries
- Host plant to many butterflies and moths including Banded Hairstreak and White-M Hairstreak

Virginia Creeper *Parthenocissus quinquefolia* Native to every county in Virginia

- Known to prevent erosion and protect watersheds
- Member of the grape family
- Can cause allergic reaction similar to poison ivy
- Host plant to several species of sphinx moths

Orange Jewelweed *Impatiens capensis* Native to every county in Virginia

- Another common name of this plant is spotted touch-me-not
- Blooms from July to October
- Attracts hummingbirds, bees, and butterflies

Common Milkweed *Asclepias syriaca* Native to every county in Virginia

- Named after the latex, found in their stems, leaves and pods.
- Produces high quality nectar and relies on a variety of pollinators for its reproduction
- Host plant to the Monarch Butterfly
