MANAGER'S COMMENTS

Mr. Vithoulkas announced Henrico celebrates our diverse community of Hispanic Americans who contribute to the vibrance of the County by investing resources, ideas, and ingenuity into the day-to-day operations and community development that are vital to how the County delivers services at all levels. From September 15 - October 15, the County takes time to appreciate the contributions from the County's Hispanic communities and employees who are integral to serving, uplifting, and innovating with future generations in mind. He invited everyone to visit Henrico County Public Library and Henrico County Recreation & Parks locations in person and online as well as the County's Multicultural Community Engagement website for cultural and heritage resources.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Maria Maldonado, who works as a bilingual worker for the Richmond-Henrico Health District, as well as a My Henrico Academy ambassador, to bring remarks in recognition of Hispanic Heritage Month. , ,

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Ms. Maldonado stated it is an honor to share some comments. She explained she arrived in Los Angeles, California, when she was 15 and came to Henrico in 2002, where she became an American citizen. Ms. Maldonado stated she was proud to represent the Hispanic community. Her experience in the My Henrico Academy has given her the opportunity to know all the departments and work closely with the County. Ms. Maldonado thanked the Board and the Manager for the support and the opportunity to celebrate the diversity of our community.

Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Dennis Bickmeier, Executive Director of the Henrico Sports & Entertainment Authority, for winning a prestigious accolade recently bestowed upon the Sports and Event Center. At the Virginia Restaurant Lodging & Travel Association's annual Ordinary Awards, the Center was honored with the 2024 Attraction of the Year Award.

Henrico has strategically cultivated tourism growth, and the results are evident. Recently, the Virginia Tourism Corporation affirmed Henrico's position as fifth in the state for visitor spending, amounting to nearly \$1.9 billion in 2023. These figures reflect the substantial economic impact of tourism, which supports nearly 10,500 jobs with a combined payroll exceeding \$610 million last year. Moreover, tourism generated substantial tax revenues, contributing over \$81 million to the County and \$45 million to the state.

Mr. Bickmeier thanked the Board and the Manager for the recognition. Mr. Bickmeier stated two staff members were not present because they are in California at a conference where the Center is a finalist for a national award for sports venue of the year.

Mr. Vithoulkas took a moment to talk about an ongoing matter that is of profound concern for all of us at the County – the matter of vehicle crashes in our County involving pedestrians. In 2024 calendar year, 10 pedestrians have died in Henrico after being struck by a vehicle. Last week, our community lost a 63-year-old teacher from Brookland Middle School after she was struck in a parking lot off West Broad Street. Two weeks ago, we lost a 15-year-old student from Hermitage High School after he was struck while crossing Staples Mill Road. These losses are heartbreaking for their families and friends – and for our entire community. At our last Board meeting, Chair Nelson detailed what this County has been doing to make walking and biking safer. The County has constructed 75 miles of sidewalk over the past five years. The County currently has 57 active pedestrian-safety improvement projects – funded at \$170 million – under development countywide.

We have installed street lighting at the 250-plus traffic signals that are maintained by the County and are working closely with VDOT to install lighting at signals that are maintained by the state. Tonight, staff will ask the Board to approve an additional \$1.5 million. This funding will be dedicated to improving lighting along specific corridors identified by our Public Works as being lighting-deficient.

Mr. Vithoulkas continued that this is what the County is doing, but we need the community's help. Our residents, pedestrians, and drivers have a responsibility here as well. Henrico Police data indicates that close to 90% of pedestrian fatalities occur at night. For pedestrians who are out after dark, please do all you can to make yourself visible. Carry a flashlight or use the app on your cell phone. Wear light-colored clothing, or even better, wear something reflective. Over the past year, the County's WOAH! Safety campaign has distributed more than 10,000 reflective safety vests to our community members – and we want to distribute more. They are available for free at our government centers, libraries, and police stations. We will have 1,000 available at the Festival of India this weekend. We are working with our community partners such as the YMCA to make these vests even more accessible for everyone.

For drivers, please watch your speed and stick to posted speed limits. Do not engage in distracted driving, regardless of the cause of the distraction. And remember, under Virginia law, it is illegal to hold a cell phone while you are driving.

Ladies and gentlemen, be assured that Henrico County is committed to making a difference for our residents and our community. October is designated as Pedestrian Safety Month, which gives us another opportunity to raise even more awareness of this issue. Mr. Vithoulkas recognized Ben Sheppard, Director of Public Relations, to give the Board an update on what the County will be doing for Pedestrian Safety Month. He explained they will be taking full advantage to recognize this month, using our County website and working with our paid advertisers by make announcements with *Henrico Citizen* and Radio One. He stated the Board will be holding a press conference on October 22 to showcase the efforts.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS' COMMENTS

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Mr. Schmitt recognized Troop 735 & Troop 736 who participated earlier in Local Government 101. The following Troop Members participated from 735: Max Fullerton, Oliver Mathews, Jeremiah Meier, CJ Mumford, Adam Sayah, and Ryan Zeineddine. Troop Members from 736 were: Zoey Jones, Makenzie Ladd, Caroline O'Shea, Samantha Shrader, and Theresa Synder. Mr. Schmitt thanked the troop leader and the troop members for coming out and noted as they work towards their community service badge, please let him know if they need anything from the Board. He also gave each troop member a WOAH vest.

Ms. Whitehead announced she was excited to welcome students from the Tree of Life who put together a magazine. The magazine is led by middle school students and is written by kids for kids on mental health and other very important topics. She noted the goal is to be published in grocery stores and other locations. The following students were present: Ira Thackeray, Emily Illicete, Anika Chatta, Nathan Singh, Tara, and Reyansh Gupta. Ira thanked the Board for allowing them to come to the Board to present their magazine and stated it was so much fun to go out in the community and speak with individuals such as her bus driver. She hopes that they continue to make a voice for themselves in the future. Ms. Whitehead gave each member a WOAH vest.

Mr. Stiefvater thanked the Board and the Manager and stated he was honored and humbled to stand before the Board this evening. He explained when he started working for the County, Mr. LaVecchia was the Manager, noting much has changed and the County has improved a lot since then. Mr. Stiefvater stated Henrico has been good to him. His wife Linda and he made the wise choice to live in the County.

She thanked the Board and the Manager for recognizing Active Aging Week. She explained there will be activities across the County. Ms. Giles shared several events for the week and encouraged all Henrico residents to attend.

PUBLIC HEARINGS - REZONING CASES AND PROVISIONAL USE PERMITS

271-24Forest Avenue Office LLC: Request to rezone from B-2C Business DistrictREZ-2024-(Conditional), B-3C Business District (Conditional), O-3C Office District100545(Conditional), and M-1 Light Industrial District to UMU-PDC UrbanTuckahoeMixed Use - Planned Development District (Conditional) Parcels 766-744-5757, 766-744-5838, 766-745-8010, 767-744-3162, 767-744-6580, 767-744-7864, 767-744-9052, 767-745-5610, 766-745-8230, and 767-744-6325containing 52.41 acres located at the northwest intersection of W. BroadStreet (U.S. Route 250) and Forest Avenue.

No one from the public spoke in opposition to this item.

On motion of Mr. Rogish, seconded by Mr. Schmitt, and by unanimous vote, the Board followed the recommendation of the Planning Commission and approved this item with the following proffered conditions:

- 1. <u>Pattern Book.</u> The Property must be developed in general conformance with the details, standards, illustrations, and information set forth in the pattern book entitled "REYNOLDS CROSSING Pattern Book", dated August 6, 2024, and prepared by Baskervill (the "Pattern Book") (see case file), which shall serve as the "Planned Development Master Plan". The Conceptual Build-Out Plan provided in the Pattern Book will be deemed the "Concept Plan". All illustrations and information in the Pattern Book are conceptual in nature and may vary in detail. If the development is not in general conformance with the Pattern Book, deviations may be approved in any subsequent ("POD"), subdivision approval, or any variations permitted by the Director of Planning upon the Director of Planning finding that the variations are generally in keeping with the spirit and concept of the Pattern Book.
- 2. <u>Uses.</u>
 - (a) All uses permitted in the UMU-PD district found in Section 24-4205 are allowed except for the following which are prohibited on the Property:

- (1)Gun shop, sales, and repair.
- (2)Alternative lending institution.
- (3)Billboard signs.
- (4) Light manufacturing.
- (5)Automotive filing station.
- Restaurants used for a fast food restaurant with a (6)drive-through service, not to exclude, however, fastcasual restaurants such as Panera and Starbucks, restaurants with dedicated parking for the pickup of carry-out food, nor restaurants whose primary business is the sale of specialty coffees or other nonalcoholic beverages or pastries.

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- Convenience store that is free standing or sells (7) gasoline.
 - Laundromat. (8)
 - (9) Marina.

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- Manufacturing and Production. (10)
- (11)Indoor shooting range.
- (12)Historical horse racing and similar skill games.
- (13)Outdoor shooting range.
- (14)Outdoor race track.
- Fortune teller or palmist. (15)
- Commercial recycling/collection center. (16)
- Helicopter landing facility. (17)
- (18)Passenger terminal (surface transportation).
- (19)Freestanding wireless communications tower.
- (20)Kennel or animal shelter.
- **(b)** Residential uses are permitted on the Property, subject to the following:
 - (1)At least three (3) residential housing types are required on the Property, one of which will be rental or for-sale upper story dwellings over commercial or office uses, and may include other residential types, including rental residential multi-family buildings, townhomes for sale, two over two townhome and condominiums for sale. If Zoning Ordinance Section 24-3507.C.2 is revised to reduce the number of required housing types, then the new number of housing types will apply herein.
 - (2)
- Density limits for each individual area of the Property (based on the "PHASING PLAN" in the Pattern Book, each an "Area") (see case file) will be consistent with the density calculations set forth in the Pattern Book which may be revised as approved by the Director of Planning at the time of POD review, provided the overall permitted density on the entirety of the Property is not exceeded. Any density increases allowed for Environmentally Friendly Design

Incentives set out in Division 9 of Article 5 in the Zoning Ordinance can be applied to individual Areas as provided at the time of POD and based on the overall acreage of the Property. No more than five percent (5%) of the rental dwelling units in any Area can have three (3) or more bedrooms. 3. <u>Building Standards.</u> Development of buildings on the Property is subject to the following building standards, unless otherwise approved at the time of POD review:

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- (a) Existing buildings located on the Property are permitted by right as they currently exist, including with respect to, but not limited to, existing architecture, form, massing, setbacks, road frontage, lighting, parking, screening and landscaping, building height and size, parcel size and any other building standards set forth in the Pattern Book (see case file) or the Code. Any expansion of an existing building will be in general conformance with the standards set forth in the Pattern Book and so long as the architecture is in conformance with the existing architecture and form of that building or the Pattern Book.
- (b) New buildings constructed on the Property must be in general conformance with the Pattern Book (see case file), including, without limitation, (i) the illustrations included in the Pattern Book, and (ii) charts and standards set forth in the Pattern Provided, however, notwithstanding any such Book. illustrations, blank flat wall surfaces on new buildings will be avoided to the extent possible, such that such surfaces will provide for variation and interest in design, appearance, and massing, such as facade changes for height, recesses, fenestration, building and accent materials, or the appearance of fenestration and architectural articulation. For purposes of these proffers. "wall surfaces" will not be deemed to include columns. pilasters. trim, gutters. accent materials. architectural features, windows, doors, bay doors, piers, wall sections and headers near roll up doors and loading doors.
- (c) All buildings constructed on the Property shall have exposed exterior walls (above finished grade) constructed of brick, glass, cast stone panels and shapes, split-face masonry units, composite aluminum panels, pre-cast or cast in place architectural concrete or masonry material, including hardieboard, and exterior insulating finish systems, and varying amounts of natural stone, marble, exposed aggregate concrete, unless different architectural treatment and/or materials are requested and specifically approved at the time of POD review. No building shall be covered with or have exposed to view any painted or unfinished smooth concrete block,

corrugated aluminum, iron and/or steel, unless used as accent material or otherwise requested and specifically approved at the time of POD review.

- (d) The illustrations in the Pattern Book (see case file) are conceptual in nature and may vary in detail. In the event a proposed building is not in general conformance with the Pattern Book, deviations may be approved at the time of any POD review, subdivision approval, or any other time permitted by the Director of Planning upon the Director finding that the deviations are generally in keeping with the spirit and concept of the illustrations shown in the Pattern Book.
- (e) The setbacks set forth for buildings in the LDR-1 parcel in the Building Placement Strategy chart on page 12 of the Pattern Book (see case file) will be measured from the boundary line of the block, or if less than an entire block, then that portion of the block in which the LDR-1 buildings are contained.

4. Buffers and Landscaping.

(a) **Buffers.**

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- Overall. Any buffer within the Property required herein (1)shall be natural and landscaped and may include supplemental plantings, utilities, berms and/or fencing and other purposes as approved at the time of landscape plan review, including sidewalks and multiuse trails. Utility easements (including drainage) shall be permitted within such buffer, provided, any such utility easements shall be extended generally perpendicular through such buffer. Any existing dead, diseased or fallen trees and vegetation may be removed as necessary.
- (2) <u>Interstate 64.</u> A buffer area will be provided along the Interstate 64 right-of-way, a minimum of twenty-five (25) feet in width and planted to the level of transitional buffer 25.
- (3) <u>West Broad Street.</u> A buffer area will be provided along West Broad Street right-of-way, a minimum of twentyfive (25) feet in width and planted to the level of a transitional buffer 25.
- (b) **Forest Avenue.** Street trees currently existing along Forest Avenue will be preserved to the extent possible. Any landscaping on the southside of Forest Avenue will be maintained as it currently exists, until such area is dedicated to the County.

5. <u>Parking Plan.</u> Parking will be provided as shown on the page of the Pattern Book entitled

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"CONCEPTUAL FULL BUILD-OUT YIELD ANALYSIS" (the "Parking Projections") (see case file). As required at the time of POD review, the parking study dated June 25, 2024, will be updated based on the required parking and shared parking set forth in the Zoning Ordinance, which will allow revisions of the Parking Projections. Each POD must identify the location and means of providing alternative parking areas from the Parking Projections during redevelopment/construction. A minimum 8 electric vehicle ("EV") parking spaces shall be provided on the Property, unless otherwise specifically approved at the time of POD review, with at least 1 universal EV charger for each 2 EV parking spaces.

6. <u>Private Streets.</u> Following construction of any new private street, the Applicant must provide the County Planning Department with certification from a licensed engineer that the street was constructed according to the applicable Concept Plan (see case file) or POD, and in compliance with County Road design standards and specifications (except as to pavement width and turning radii). Such construction must include proper compaction of the subbase soils, utility trenches, base stone, and the base asphalt surface.

7. Blocks and Internal Streets.

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- (a) A sidewalk or multi-use trail will be provided along the Property's entire frontage on Forest Avenue, provided the sidewalk or multi-use trail may be located within the Property as determined appropriate at the time of Plan of Development to preserve any existing trees located along Forest Avenue. Such sidewalk and multi-use trail may be located within the buffer and landscaping area along Forest Avenue.
- (b) Except for the existing commercial buildings, for any block length that exceeds 800 feet in length, a street or pedestrian way must be provided mid-block such that no more than any continuous length exceeds 600 feet without a street or pedestrian way.
- (c) If the existing commercial buildings are redeveloped/reconstructed such that a mid-block street or pedestrian way is feasible, a mid-block street or pedestrian way must be provided.
- (d) Internal streets not shown in the Pattern Book (see case file) but developed at the time of POD approval must conform to one of the Streetscape Sections provided in the Pattern Book or as otherwise approved by the Director of Planning.
- (e) At the time of POD, road widths shown in the Pattern Book

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(see case file) may be reduced if approved by the Fire Department and the Director of Planning. Such reductions can be accomplished with the use of midblock hardscapes or other methods to create the twenty-four (24) foot clearance needed for fire apparatus to serve tall buildings.

- 8. <u>Parking Structures.</u> Parking structures that are not faced or wrapped with commercial, office, or residential uses, must be cladded or screened in a manner that is consistent with the Pattern Book (see case file). Any parking deck must have an exterior facade with a minimum of forty percent (40%) opacity.
- 9. <u>Residential Recycling Facilities.</u> Recycling facilities must be provided for the residential development for so long as the County either provides or sponsors some form of recycling service. Outside recycling and refuse collection area(s) provided must comply with the requirements set forth in Section 24-4428 of the Zoning Ordinance.
- 10. <u>Emergency Communication Systems.</u> The Applicant must install a fire command center and emergency radio communication equipment within any new building exceeding sixty (60) feet in height to allow for adequate public safety and radio coverage within and between the buildings. A communications consultant must certify such equipment as compatible with the County's emergency communications systems within ninety (90) days of the owner or tenant obtaining a Certificate of Occupancy ("C/O") for any such building. The County is permitted to perform communications testing within the buildings at any time.
- 11. <u>Fire Protection-Structured Parking.</u> A three-inch (3") standpipe for fire protection must be provided within all structured parking at approximately 200-foot intervals or consistent with the standards of the Virginia Construction Code, whichever is more restrictive. The exact location of these improvements and any necessary deviations will be determined by the Division of Fire during POD review.
- 12. <u>Fire Protection.</u> All new structures, including parking structures, other than open, standalone parking garages, must be fully sprinkled for fire protection or consistent with the standards of the Virginia Construction Code.
- 13. <u>Design Criteria and Standards.</u> In addition to the following, the standards and examples set forth in the Pattern Book (see case file) apply to the Property. The location and design of the various elements listed (as appropriate) will be included at the time of POD review. Deviations may be approved by the Director of Planning upon the Director of Planning finding that variations in these standards are generally in keeping with the spirit and concept of the Pattern Book.

(a) Signage.

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- (1) New signage must be consistent with the sign program set forth in the Pattern Book (see case file).
- (2) Signs may be illuminated with internal lighting, external lighting, or a combination of both.
- (3) Lighting for signs will be selected and installed to avoid glare or impaired vision.
- (4) No changeable message signs will be permitted.
- (b) Site Lighting. New site lighting must be consistent with the lighting program set forth in the Pattern Book (see case file). Lighting installed adjacent to Forest Avenue will be designed so light is directed away or shielded from any residential homes located adjacent to the Property.
- (c) Heating, Ventilation, and Air Conditioning ("HVAC").
 - (1) HVAC installed on roofs must be screened by roof or architecture features when viewed from the ground at the Property line.
 - (2) Ground mounted HVAC must be screened from view at the Property line with approved fencing or landscaping.
- (d) Bicycle and Pedestrian Facilities.
 - In addition to on-site bicycle parking facilities required by the Zoning Ordinance, each multifamily building or residential mixed-use building with more than ninety (90) dwelling units must provide an enclosed bicycle storage area in the building or in the parking garage that has a bicycle parking capacity equal to at least five (5) percent of the number of residential units within the buildings.
 - (2) Crosswalks will be provided at key locations on the Property and clearly signed and visible for safe navigation as generally shown on the "Roadway Diagrams" within the Pattern Book (see case file).
 - (3) Traffic calming measures such as on-street parking, curb extensions/bump outs, changing surface material, texture, or color of street, intersections, and crossings will be provided to facilitate bicycle and pedestrian facilities and such measures will be determined at the time of POD.
- (e) Hours of Operation. Commercial uses are limited to the hours of operation restriction for the B-2 zoning district, subject to additional hours which may, in the future, be approved by Provisional Use Permit.
- 14. <u>Vendor Areas.</u> Although currently not shown in the Pattern Book (see case file), new areas of the Property may be designated at the

time of POD for the preparation of food or beverages or the sale or display of merchandise conducted in an open area or structure. One or more individual vendors operating from stalls, stands, carts, vehicles, or other spaces which are rented or otherwise made available to such vendors are permitted. Such activities may include a market, sale of merchandise as part of a permitted festival or other similar special event, or the outdoor display or sale by a single food or beverage vendor, operated as an incidental part of retail activity regularly conducted from within a permanent building on the Property. Sidewalk widths adjacent to outdoor vending areas must not be reduced to less than five (5) feet, except to accommodate a permitted festival or other similar special event. Trash receptacles must be provided and conveniently located for each block that includes an outdoor vending area. Existing areas on the Property already approved and used for vendor display or outdoor seating are not required to meet the above referenced standards unless the areas are redeveloped or redesigned.

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15. Residential Amenities.

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- (a) Each parcel will provide a minimum usable Open Space ratio either at grade, rooftop, or as defined in the County Zoning Ordinance as set forth in the Pattern Book (see case file). The entire Property will provide a minimum fifteen (15%) Open Space ratio.
- (b) In addition, each multi-family building or residential mixeduse building will provide the following indoor/outdoor amenities:
 - (1) A minimum seven hundred fifty (750) square foot club room or equivalent type lounge space.
 - (2) An additional 100 square feet of such space per 50 units or part thereof for buildings of 100 units or more.
 - (3) A mailroom to meet USPS STD-4C requirements and separate package room with 0.6' of linear space per unit and a fridge to accept chilled food and other deliveries.
 - (4) A fitness room of no less than 800 square feet.
- (c) In addition to the amenities provided in proffer 15(b), each multi-family building or residential mixed-use building containing 50-250 dwelling units will have each of the following programming requirements:
 - (1) An area with a shade structure that holds a minimum of 5 seats.
 - (2) A pool and pool deck appropriately sized for the total number of units with a shade structure.
 - (3) Access to at least (1) additional outdoor amenities as outlined below per (125) units or part thereof.
 - (4) Access to at least (1) additional indoor amenity as outlined below per (125) units or part thereof.

(d) In addition to the amenities provided in proffer 15(b), each multi-family building or residential mixed-use building containing more than 250 dwelling units will have each of the following programming requirements:

(1) A minimum of (2) areas with shade structures that holds a minimum of 5 seats.

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- (2) A pool and pool deck appropriately sized for the total number of units with a shade structure.
- (3) Access to at least (3) additional outdoor amenities as outlined below.
- (4) Access to at least (3) additional indoor amenities as outlined below.
- (e) "Additional Outdoor Amenities" include, but are not limited to: landscaped patio, covered lanai, vegetated open space, outdoor fitness/yoga space, community garden, fountain or water feature, cabana, landscaped seating area, programmed gathering space, pool side bar, fire pit area, outdoor kitchen and/or grilling area, children's playground, splash pad, tot lot, dog park, or other equivalent outdoor amenities as approved at the time of POD.
- (f) "Additional Indoor Amenities" include, but are not limited to: reservable event room, conference room, coffee bar, wine/cocktail bar, kitchenette with dining space, game room, theater room, work/study space, indoor seating/gathering space, spa, wellness center, sporting facilities, children's play spaces, bicycle storage with wash/repair station, pet spa, rentable storage units, or other equivalent indoor amenities as approved at the time of POD.
- (g) Upon the submission of a POD for any residential units, a list of amenities will be provided as part of such POD, such amenities may include amenities specific to such residential units, community wide amenities, and commercial facilities already existing or planned as part of the POD.

16. Phasing.

(a) An open space master plan (the "Open Space Master Plan") will be submitted to the County as part of the submission of the first POD for any portion of the Property. The Open Space Master Plan will identify existing open space (as defined in Section 24-5204 of the County Code ("Open Space")) on the Property, Open Space to be provided on the Property at a later phase, and the specific Open Space to be provided as part of the specific POD under review, and will include a fully itemized Open Space development package, with necessary calculations, to show the extent and type of Open Space being proposed with that particular POD and existing on the Property overall. The Open Space Master Plan will be prepared with sufficient detail to ensure the design compatibility of future improvements, avoid design conflicts, and verify general compliance with the Pattern Book (see case file) and applicable County Code requirements. The Open Space Master Plan will be updated with each POD submitted for any portion of the Property. .

- (b) The "PHASING PLAN" page of the Pattern Book (see case file) contains the preliminary phasing plan (the "Phasing Plan") for the Property. The numerical references within the Pattern Book identify the various Areas of development. Any Area may be broken into multiple parts or reconfigured as approved at the time of POD review. The phasing of development of the Property does not have to follow the numerical sequence set out on the Phasing Plan.
- (c) Notwithstanding where development may occur over time, the following improvements must be constructed as follows:
 - (1) Common areas will be developed according to Pattern Book and Phasing Plan (see case file) and as approved at the time of POD review, and will include several types of seating, shade, and public art.
 - (2) Construction or reconstruction of streets shall be consistent with the "Street Sections" contained in the Pattern Book (see case file) and may be phased such that one side of the street may be completed with any required sidewalks and landscaping before the other side of the street is completed. The improvements required for the partial street improvements will be determined at the time of POD review.
- (d) Upon any development pursuant to the Conversion Chart found on page 10 of the Pattern Book (see case file), when requested by the County at the time of any POD filings related thereto, the traffic study will be updated incorporating components of such alternative uses. Necessary road improvements related to such alternative uses must be made by the applicant as required at the time of POD.
- 17. Tree Cover.

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- (a) At the time of POD submittal for any portion of the Property, the Applicant will prepare an inventory of existing tree cover for the Property as well as what is planned for that portion of the Property subject to such POD. For each subsequent POD, the tree coverage for the entire Property will be updated as requested by the Director of Planning.
- (b) The minimum tree cover on the Property must be at least fifteen (15) percent of the Property and meet the standards set

out in Section 24-5308 of the Zoning Ordinance. The minimum tree cover will be achieved upon completion of build out of the Property.

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- (c) Additional elements to provide shade, reduce stormwater, and enhance streetscapes and the appearance of parking lots, will be provided and addressed at the time of POD review. These elements include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - (1) Sail Shades
 - (2) Trellises

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- (3) Street Trees
- (4) Rain Gardens/Bio-Retention areas
- (5) Planter Boxes
- (6) Sidewalk Canopies and Awnings
- 18. <u>Transportation Improvements</u>. The following entrance and roadway improvements will be constructed as required at the time of any POD review for the Property:
 - (a) Forest Avenue at Road E (as shown on page 11 of the Pattern Book) (see case file):
 - (1) Widen the southbound approach (site driveway; West Access) to provide a two-lane approach
 - (b) Forest Avenue at Access road (as shown on page 11 of the Pattern Book) (see case file):

WHEREAS, pedestrian safety along public roads is of critical importance to the Board of Supervisors; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors has invested heavily in new pedestrian safety features, including new sidewalks, multi-use trails, and other amenities for pedestrians in the County; and,

WHEREAS, pedestrians are more likely to be injured in conflicts with vehicles at night, along dark roadways; and,

WHEREAS, the County has made reflective pedestrian safety vests available to the public at no-charge through the Watch-Out Ahead Henrico, or WOAH, initiative to combat pedestrian accidents along dark roadways; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of Supervisors wishes to continue and increase these efforts to improve pedestrian safety along public roadways by establishing a new street light initiative; and,

WHEREAS, as part of the initiative, the County will identify high priority safety corridors and intersections on County and state-maintained roadways to install new lighting.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of Supervisors of Henrico County, Virginia, that the County Manager and Director of Public Works are authorized and directed to establish a new street light initiative to identify, install, and maintain new lighting along high priority safety corridors and intersections on County and state-maintained roadways.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Supervisors hereby appropriates \$1,500,000 of initial funding to support the initiative.
